State-supported journalism refers to journalism that is directly supported by state governments

### **Public Service and Propaganda**

- State support for journalism is often oriented toward promoting sustainable, critical, and high-quality journalism that serves the public
  - In such cases, state support is seen as a necessary correction to market failure
- However, support can also be used to create statecontrolled media, wherein organizations are used to advance the government's interests

In such cases, the media organization serves as a mouthpiece


